- 1. Answer any *ten* of the following questions: (a) "But thy eternal summer shall not fade," Whose 'summer' is referred to here? How would it be made 'eternal'? (b) Why and where is love considered 'not Time's fool'? (c) "She is all states, and all Princes, I," Locate the line and explain it. (d) Where do you find 'saucy pedantic wretch'? What is referred to by the quoted phrase? (e) "Sometime too hot the eye of heaven shines" — What is the "eye of heaven"? What is meant by "And often is his gold complexion dimm'd"? (f) Why do you think the sun is called 'Busy old fool' and 'unruly' by Donne? (g) "Or snorted we in the Seven Sleepers' den?" What is "Seven Sleepers' Den'? Bring out the allusion. (h) "Thou has it all now, King, Cawdor, Glamis, all" Who is the speaker and who is referred to as 'Thou'? (i) "O horror, horror, horror! Tongue nor heart cannot conceive, nor name thee!" Who makes this statement and what does it signify? (j) "Merciful powers, restrain in me the cursed thoughts that nature gives way to in repose." Who addresses the 'merciful powers'? What are the 'cursed thoughts'? (k) "There's daggers in men's smiles". Who makes this comment and why? (1) "Come, let me clutch thee; / I have thee not, and yet I see thee still." What does the speaker want to clutch? Describe the speaker's mental state in light of the statement. (m) "By the pricking of my thumbs, / Something wicked this way comes." Who is the speaker? What is meant by 'something'? (n) Identify and explain the figures of speech in the following extract: The child is father of the man Or. Ingratitude more strong than/ Traitors arms, quite vanguished him. (o) Identify and explain the figures of speech in the following extract:

 - (a) Comment briefly on how the opening scene of *Macbeth* sets the tone of the play.
 - (b) "Stars, hide your fires; / Let not light see my black and deep desires." Identify the speaker and the context. What is meant by 'my black and deep desires'?
 - (c) "Love's not Time's fool, though rosy lips and cheeks/ Within his bending sickle's compass come;" Explain.
 - (d) "Whatever dies, was not mixed equally; If our two loves be one, or, thou and I Love so alike, that none do slacken, none can die." - Explain
 - (e) Scan the following lines, identify the metre and find out exception, if any: I wandered lonely as a cloud That floats on high o'er vales and hills, When all at once I saw a crowd, A host, of golden daffodils;
 - (f) "It is a tale / Told by an idiot, full of sound and fury, / Signifying nothing." Who makes this statement and where? What is 'a tale' here? Why does it signify nothing?

 - (a) Examine *Twelfth Night* as festive comedy.
 - (b) Critically discuss the character of Lady Macbeth in Shakespeare's Macbeth.

How and why does Shakespeare mix comical elements in tragedy? Attempt a critical analysis of this in the light of your reading of the Act II Scene iii of *Macbeth*.

- (c) Do you think that Marlowe's *Edward II* can justifiably be called a chronicle play? Give a reasoned answer.
- (d) What is Metaphysical conceit? Critically analyse how Donne deals with these conceits in either in 'The Good Morrow' or "The Sun Rising".
